Be Not Weary in Well Doing By Nathan Reeves

Do you ever get tired of being the dad or the mom? Ever grow weary of having high expectations of your kids? Ever want to just hop on a plane to Cancun? Well, when it comes to parenting, "...be not weary in well doing." (2 Thessalonians 3:13) Instead, be consistent. Hang in there. Stay with it.

Be consistent in training. This includes things like chores, homework, and piano lessons. It happens at home, at the store, in church, and at social gatherings. Train them to say things like "yes, sir," "please," and "no, thank you." Train them to work hard. Don't accept laziness. If something is not done right, consistently have them go back and try it again. Train them to say "I love you" by saying it yourself. If you start when they're young, it just becomes something your family says on a regular basis. Train them to speak to adults. Few things are more frustrating to adults than when you wave or say "hello" to a child and get nothing in return. Train them to write thank you notes. It may seem like a small thing, but it can pay big dividends. There's a sweet lady at our church who told me that if a high school graduate writes her a thank you note after receiving a graduation gift, she makes sure to give them a college graduation gift and a wedding gift. But only if they write a thank you note! If they don't learn it at home, where will they learn it? Instead of being weary, be consistent.

Be consistent in obedience and honor. Obedience is the outward show of inward honor. Once our kids have honored in their heart, outward obedience comes naturally and easily. Don't accept good actions with bad attitudes. We parents can grow weary of attitude and slip into thinking that the child obeyed because they did what we asked of them. But if they didn't do it the way we wanted (with a good attitude), it's not obedience. Have them do it again but with a smile on their face. Dad and mom will reap what they sow when it comes to obedience and honor. Choose consistency over weariness.

Be consistent in discipline. While discipline is not the same as punishment, it certainly includes it for parents. If you say they will be punished for an action and they do the action, you better follow through. If you don't, you're training them to not believe what you say and that they can get away with wrongdoing. Also, don't harp on your kids. Colossians 3:21 says, "Fathers, provoke not your children to anger." This is the parent of the Walmart kid. (Every Walmart has a Walmart kid and they're always there!) This parent constantly says things like, "Stop that...quit it...cut it out... be quiet." Say what you mean, mean what you say, and consistently discipline. But don't be weary.

My pastor, Richard Coyle, once said, "The only unfruitful consistency is being consistently inconsistent." You may not see the fruit right away. Trust God. They're going to test your resolve. Let's determine to avoid being weary in well doing by becoming and staying consistent.
